Barbara Heine Awarded OAM

Barbara Heine has been awarded the Medal (OAM), the Order of Australia for service to the community through her work with Hippotherapy a Health Service Division of the Riding for the Disabled Association of Australia and to children and their families through her personal charity, the Kids and Families Foundation:

"It's a lovely recognition, but you don't do it for any other reason than it's a passion."

Barbara has been involved in Hippotherapy for 20 years in the USA since 1987, bringing it back

Hippotherapy is a unique treatment approach to rehabilitation provided to children and adults with brain damage by specially trained physiotherapists, occupational therapists and speech language pathologists using equine movement. Barbara is the RDAA Chairwoman of the Hippotherapy Committee.

"I've been a physio all my life and a horse person all my life," says Barb. "So it was like God had given me the gift of the perfect job. It was the most natural marriage for me of the two things I love and I love kids. I've seen it result in a wonderfully positive change in a child's ability to function. It didn't exist in Australia before then, so all the physios that practice here now I have trained."

Barbara's goal is to one day have RDAA Hippotherapy Programs running in every state. The program is on hold in Victoria as Ms Heine has been battling a rare and aggressive lymphoma for 18 months. She continues to work with the Kids and Families Foundation she founded in 2003.

COACHING UPDATE

Coaching Report Feb. 2010

I hope everyone had an enjoyable and restful time over the Christmas break and have lots of enthusiasm and energy for the start of the 2010 RDA programs.

For all of us it is always full on at the beginning of a new year, training new volunteers, updating established volunteers, assessing riders / drivers and planning individual programs to suit.

The following updates on works-in-progress and completed tasks are relevant to all coaches and will hopefully be of value to assist you with tools and information for your centre.

Volunteer Training

By now you will all have received and be familiar with the new competency-based *Volunteer Training package*. Now is the time to train and tick off all volunteers, new and old with this system. It ensures consistency of standards and training and therefore easy for volunteers who move to another centre, interstate or otherwise to have documentation to show the areas in which they are accredited.

As you know the RDAA Volunteer Booklet is part of the package and is out of stock as it needs updating in some areas. However there is still relevant information in it for all volunteers and I would suggest that you use it for your new volunteers by giving them a photocopy. We will update as soon as possible and have the new one printed and loaded onto the new secure online Coaches Portal. I will keep you informed of the progress. This package is available from your state office or from the RDAA website's new coach's portal coming shortly.

Re-accreditation of OTC and Level 1 Syllabi

A couple of us are working very hard to update this coach education material in conjunction with the ASC sports consultant and in line with the decisions made at the Course Review and Assessment Workshop in November last year. We are nearly there. In the meantime the current OTC and Level 1 are still to be used and you will be able to finish your accreditation with these documents.

Level 1 Manual

All the modules have been written and we are just waiting on the people who are reviewing it before

it can be formatted and printed in line with the amended Level 1 syllabus.

Implementation of Decisions from the Course Review and Assessment Workshop in Nov 2009

As part of this workshop there was a review of the current procedures and qualifications for Coach Educators and Assessors and in line with accepted current practice there was complete agreement on some changes to the pre-requisites and updating for these roles. There will need to be a formal roll out later this year and in the meantime the current procedures are still in place.

■ Level One Pole Work

The above has been completed and is available from your state office and shortly from the RDAA website coach's portal. They consist of:

- Level 1 Pole Work Module 12 for Workbook and the Manual which will be incorporated into the new Level 1 Workbook and Manual
- Stand alone Pole Work, Workbook and the Manual. This is for Level One coaches who want to teach pole work or for OTC coaches who have the experience to do this module.
- Competency Assessment form for Level 1 Pole Work

Level 2 Jumping Modules

The above has been completed and is available from your state office and shortly from the RDAA website coach's portal. They consist of:

- Level 2 Jumping to replace Module 6.3 and 6.4 in your Level 2 Workbook
- Level 2 stand alone Jumping Workbook (same as above) and Manual. The prerequisite for doing this stand alone module is to hold a Level 1 Pole Work accreditation.
- Competency assessment form for Level 2 Jumping.

RDAA Workshop

We hope to confirm in the near future that there will be a national work shop held at Marcus Oldham College in Victoria on 2-5 July 2010.

The draft content (TBC) for the workshop will be:

- The introduction and roll out of the updated OTC and Level 1 syllabi.
- A Presenters course which will be a prerequisite for assessors and coach educators.
- A presentation and opportunity to be assessed for the Level 1 Pole Work Module and Level 2 Jumping.

Horse Forms

There has been general agreement on a generic set of RDAA horse forms which can be used by all states and added to as necessary taking into account weather conditions and other requirements within each state.

These will be distributed in March 2010. There again the advantage of consistency between states is recognised and acknowledged by all.

CALLLING ALL COACHES! URGENT PRODUCT RECALL OF DUBLIN ONYX HELMET

The manufacturer of Dublin Onyx helmets wishes to voluntarily recall all *Black or White basic Dublin Onyx Helmets* for inspection due to a possible manufacturing fault.

The outer shell is coming away from the foam inner mould due to insufficient gluing at point of manufacture. This problem affects only the basic Dublin Onyx Helmet in Black & White (Item codes: 441218 – 441241) and does not affect Purple Onyx helmets, wick lined or leather harness versions.

The problem only affects stock made in China, not previous stock made in New Zealand. You can identify if your helmet was made in China by looking for the internal sewn in label with "Made in China" on the reverse side.

If you have purchased this item since 1 Dec 2009, please contact the store of purchase urgently to arrange inspection of your helmet.

Note to all gear check stewards:

It is recommended that for any forthcoming events, stewards ask each rider to read the recall notice and confirm they have checked their helmet accordingly before competing.

Para-Equestrian Sport Update



On 1 Jan 2009 Equestrian Australia (EA) assumed responsibility for managing the Para-Equestrian High Performance program. Information &

Australia's first-ever International Para-Equestrian Event was a great success. The competition was held in conjunction with the Saddleworld Dressage Festival at Werribee Park National Equestrian Centre, VIC. 10-13 Dec 2009. This was first time that a Para-Equestrian Event (CPEDI3*) was incorporated with a major Dressage event (CDI-W) in Australia.

"The event really was what we had hoped for. Australian riders had some stiff competition from visitors, our Judging panel did a fantastic job and the integration of Para-Equestrian with the Dressage Festival was seamless. A very valuable experience for all concerned in the lead up to the World Games," Tracey Lesslie EA Para-Equestrian Sport Consultant and Event Director.

The event had an international jury of Judges headed by Hanneke Gerritsen (NED); including Anne Prain (FRA), Jan Geary (AUS), Marc Urban (BEL) and Wendy Barker (AUS).

"The event was very good, it was well organised & a very good effort for the first time. There were some very good performances," said Hanneke who will Judge at the 2010 World Equestrian Games.

Australia won the Team Competition. Teams from New Zealand, Canada and Japan competed on borrowed horses, with the exception of two New Zealand riders who bought their own horses. The Australian team consisted of Sharon Jarvis (WA) & Nicole Kullen (NSW) who both competed for Australia at the 2008 Beijing Paralympics & team newcomers Kate Doughty (VIC) & Fleur Lister (WA)

- 4th New Zealand

Therapeutic Riding Intern Research Opportunity

Therapeutic horseback riding is used as a means of physical and psychological therapy for individuals with a very wide spread of developmental, neurological and behavioural disorders. While great strides have been made over the past 15 years, there is little evidence-based research in the field that supports therapeutic riding as a viable alternative therapy.

Samantha Case is a graduate university student in USA and is the granddaughter of Mary & Lyttleton Gould, founders of High Hopes Therapeutic Riding, Connecticut, one of the top riding centres in USA.

Are you an RDA parent or do you know one?

Samantha is asking for RDA parents input for her current research project to 'help determine whether or not equine-assisted activities have any links with aggression and social competence in children with special needs'.

Many NAHRA Accredited Centres (USA) and RDA UK Centres have already agreed to participate. Samantha would like include RDA Centres in Australia. She has already carried out a pilot survey with parents of participants of a therapeutic riding center in the United States in an attempt to determine whether or not equine-assisted activities had any links with aggression and social competence in children with special needs.

Her results, despite the small response, were phenomenal and have prompted her to continue this line of research. In Feb 2010, Samantha will be distributing a survey for *parents of children & adolescents 17 years of age and younger* to complete. This survey will be accessible as an online form and she will be asking parents worldwide to complete it. The survey will only take about 15 minutes to complete and <u>no</u> personally identifying information will asked so that confidentiality is maintained.

Samantha's would like to receive 1,000+ responses from participating countries (i.e. Australia, UK and USA) and hopes that this study will produce evidence-based research to support passionate parents & professionals claims that equine assisted activity can assist children with special needs.

The more parents who participate in this international study the more powerful the

outcome. The online survey will be available in March 2010 at www.rda.org.au.


As a result of this intensive 4 day program our young coaches were able to complete and fast track their qualifications to the next level:

Thanking your Donors

Your organisation's 'Thank You' letter is the most important communication that a donor receives:

- Only 4/10 donors say they always receive a 'thank-you letter after they make a donation', i.e. other 6/10 donors don't! (Burke, 2000, Donor-Centred Fundraising)
- 5/10 donors stop giving, or give less, because they feel, that their giving isn't appreciated (1997 National Survey of Giving, Volunteering & Participating Study)
- 2008 Bank of America Survey on 'why wealthy donors stop giving', the number one reason cited was because donors 'no longer feel connected to an organisation'; the same answer was given by 6/10 wealthy donors.

Fundraising Tip!

Make sure you thank your donors – in writing! Audit and edit every 'Thank You' letter you send; preferably within 2-3days of receiving a donation.


Problems Sending Big Files
